

Testicular Cancer - Key Messages and Talking Points

- Testicular cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in New Zealand teens and young men, typically between the ages of 15 and 44 but can occur at any age.
- 188ⁱ men (on average) are diagnosed with testicular cancer each year and 7 will die from the disease.
- Testicular cancer occurs when abnormal cells develop in the testes, usually only affecting one testicle, but sometimes both.
- Because it occurs mostly in younger men, testicular cancer casts a long shadow especially with the potential impact on fertility.
- The good news is that testicular cancer is very treatable when caught early.
- The earlier the cancer is found and treated the better a man's chance for complete recovery and the easier the treatment protocol.
- Testicular cancer may not cause symptoms in the early stages but could include a painless lump, swelling, or change in shape or size of a testicle. Please note, these symptoms can be caused by noncancerous medical conditions.
- Guys, detection is in your hands. Get into a regular habit of checking the fellas and if you're suspicious of anything out of the ordinary going on down there get it checked out. *Do not* wait for it to go away!
- And have that conversation with your mates, remind them to make a date with their testicles. No conversation is too difficult to tackle when it comes to your health.
- Medical Advisor to Testicular Cancer NZ, Consultant Urologist Dr Andrew Williams says, "Testicular Cancer is one of the most treatable forms of cancer if detected early, with a survival rate of 95%, making checking for symptoms on a monthly basis an important part of awareness and education around the disease".
