PPTA Professional conference 2020 Update 3

This paper gives a further update on the planning for the PPTA Education Conference to be held in Wellington from 22 – 24 April 2020 (HX18/072, HX19/018, HX19/060).

Update

PPTA has a key role to play in shaping the future of education in Aotearoa New Zealand. The professional conference is an opportunity to show the public that we not only care deeply about the rights of teachers but are also passionate about education itself.

PPTA Education '20 is ready to go and promises to be a lively, engaging and thought-provoking gathering. Registrations are now open. People who have pre-registered have been contacted, and all PPTA members have been emailed a link to the registration page. We need to take every opportunity to promote this conference and encourage members to come. The venue is limited to 300 people.

The theme of the conference is "Advancing the dream of public education". To help us do that we have six keynote speakers, 27 workshops, 14 research papers and a parallel Māori-medium strand running on day two. There will be plenty of opportunity for our members to talk, listen, share and challenge one another about the future of education. The majority of the workshops are run by teachers and the research papers are a mix of academics, researchers and teacher researchers.
